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Pastor's Corner: Melting snow reveals green grass

A few weeks ago, a lot of snow fell at our house. By no means an all-time record, but it just kept coming down, hour after hour, all day long. When it stopped snowing, white powder covered all of our yard in a heavy blanket. And the blanket *staved*. For days and days and days. And then this week something happened. After I had gotten used to the white blanket being there, covering everything, it began to recede. Patches of green began to appear. The blanket of white thinned out. The green patches got larger and larger. And by today, almost all of the snow has melted, revealing my green lawn.

I didn't grow up with snow, and it holds kind of a fascination for

me. And I've been thinking about this snowfall in light of what kind of year it's been. It's been an awful year of being in lockdown, learning to wear masks and maintain social distance, learning to worship outdoors and online, watching as the news tells us day by day how many lives have been lost to the virus. I think of the season we've been through like the snow. It just keeps coming, and it blankets everything. It's impossible to ignore.

But all the time the snow was on the ground, the green grass was there underneath. And the snow actually nurtured the grass as it melted, infusing it with water that will nourish it for weeks and weeks, if not longer. I'm reminded of something that James, Jesus' younger brother, wrote: "Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance. Let perseverance finish its work so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything." (James 1:2-4)

This year has been unspeakably hard. We have been tested by disease, death, fear and hardship. But I am convinced that under the blanket of the pandemic, God has been growing our faith and trust in Jesus. It's green underneath.

New book study starting soon



Hart provides incisive insights into Scripture and history, along with illuminating personal stories, to help us identify how the witness of the church has become mangled by Christendom, white supremacy, and religious nationalism. The book explores practical ways to work in our communities to contribute to racial equity.




