#### Pastor's Corner: Being over doing

Advent begins this year on Sunday November 28th. Advent marks the beginning of the Christian year. It is a season for us to prepare our hearts and lives for the coming of Jesus. The church I grew up in didn't observe Advent. It was a zero to sixty in five seconds kind of thing. One week it's an ordinary Sunday and then bang it's Christmas Eve and there are poinsettias everywhere and the pastor is wearing a red necktie and the choir is singing Christmas carols. It doesn't help that in south Louisiana the temperature is often in the seventies the week before Christmas.

Things were not that different at home either. After we got home from church on Christmas Eve, my dad and I would put up the Christmas tree, with my mom telling us when it was straight. Then the three of us would decorate the tree and I would read the Christmas story from the Gospel of Luke.

Perhaps that is why Advent is such a big deal to me. I started pastoring when I was in college, and I remember introducing the practice of Advent in the opencountry church I pastored. I remember making an Advent wreath out of styrofoam and aluminum foil, and finding Advent candle readings in the early days of the Internet by actually looking them up in books from my seminary library.

Down the decades since then, it's remained important to me to spend the season leading up to Christmas making room in our hearts for the arrival of Jesus the King.

This year, our theme for Advent is *restoration*. What is it in your

life that needs restoration? Where in your life with Jesus do you need renewal? As you celebrate Advent this year, I want to challenge you to set aside time weekly on Sunday afternoon after worship to reflect on the Scriptures we will be looking at in worship, and seeking out the connections between those words and your life. Particularly, we are going to be looking at parts of the Hebrew Bible book of Isaiah, where God reveals God's dream for humanity to live in peace - peace that flows from Jesus.

I invite you to make space and time in your life this Advent to wait expectantly for the arrival of Jesus, and to experience the restoration that he offers.

## Stewardship: Moving on from 2022 to 2023

During the holiday season let's focus on a strong finish to 2022 as we look ahead to 2023. The latest month end financial report, October, shows the 2022 deficit at around \$15,000. The primary contributing factors of this are declining tithes and offerings (approx. \$12,000 less than 2021) and increases in certain expenses (Utilities/Fuel and Payroll up approx. \$13,500 from 2021).

As of this writing there are five Sundays remaining in 2022. Let's make a prayerful effort to at least halve the deficit by years' end.

Our Annual Business Meeting is Sunday, Jan. 29, 2023. Please mark your calendars and plan to attend. This is an important time to come together as a Church family to reflect on the past year and plan for 2023. While the Ministry Team is still working on the agenda for the meeting, one important item will be the 2023 budget. Also, in light of Pastor Michael's first threeyear term recently ending we will be voting to approve a second term.

Finally, now is the time of year when you may be asked to serve as a Commission leader or member, so please be receptive to the prospect of God's calling or even reach out to someone on the Ministry Team and volunteer if you are ready to step forward.

#### Worship: Restoration is near!

This year's Advent-Epiphany theme focuses on restoration. Restoration happens in our bodies when we heal. Restoration happens when our communities handle conflict well and promote justice. Restoration can happen in relationships between people; it can happen between us and God. Jesus himself was restored in the resurrection. Our world longs for restoration, and God acts to bring it about.

Fundamentally, restoration is a *process*: it is a labor that happens over time through God's effort and our participation. Look for themes of *our* action and *God's* action woven throughout this season.

- Restoration is a process of *renewal*: bringing back to newness what has been broken, damaged or worn.
- Restoration is sometimes a process of assembly: bringing different pieces together as they should be to create a beautiful whole.
- Restoration is a process of *transformation*: sometimes the restored object needs to be overhauled or rebuilt to be fully restored.
- Restoration can include a process of *sorting*: removing what no longer serves

and reorganizing or refreshing what remains.

- Restoration is certainly a *creative* process: reimaging wholeness is a messy situation, creating something that was not there before.
- Restoration often requires outside action: we participate in the process, but it is God who is our restorer, the one to whom Psalm 80 is addressed:
  "Restore us, O God: let your face shine that we may be saved."

Advent and Christmas are active seasons. Advent itself means "coming." The primary actor is God, emptying Godself and being born in human likeness. But humans have their share of action in the stories surrounding Christ's birth: angel visits, travel, pilgrimage and escape.

And we are active in our time too: longing, seeking, reconciling. In these weeks of Advent and Christmas, together we will cry out for restoration. We will watch for restoration to take place among us. We will join in the restoration process with all creation.

A note of interest: The worship planning team that wrote this year's materials is from southeastern PA and includes familiar names: Charlene Smalls, a pastor of Ripple Church, Allentown, and Nathan Good, pastor of Swamp Mennonite, is well known to our congregation.
