Pastor's Corner: Hope for a weary world

By the time you read this, we will be in the last week before Advent starts. As you know, Advent is the season before Christmas, when we anticipate celebrating the birth of Jesus. It's a joyful season of preparation. In our culture, the season of Advent is overlaid with a season of increasing consumption that begins with Black Friday the day after Thanksgiving and crescendos on Christmas Eve, as desperate people comb depleted store aisles or print out images of gifts that will be delivered after Christmas. That's sad.

Here's the truth: Jesus said: "It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 10:35). What would it be like if, this year, rather than giving people things they don't need, you took the money and gave it to the Quakertown Food Bank or the Code

Blue homeless shelter? Then you would be obeying Jesus' command in Matthew 25 to feed the hungry and shelter the unhoused.

This Advent, we will be going on a journey together. On the first Sunday of Advent, each person will receive *A Calendar of Devotions*, written by Charity Goodwin. This booklet, provided by the Discipleship Commission, has a Scripture passage, a short reading and a prayer or practice for each day of Advent. I encourage you to use the booklet in your daily time of prayer and Bible reading. If that's not a part of your daily pattern, the booklet represents a great opportunity to begin the practice. If you would like to discuss the Scriptures and readings with others, that's what we're going to be doing in the TLC (Topics, Learning and Con-

versation) Class during Advent. We meet in the conference room upstairs at 9:30 on Sunday mornings.

In the Christmas song *O Holy Night*, the lyrics say: "O holy night, the stars are brightly shining/It is the night of our dear Savior's birth./Long lay the world in sin and error pining/Till he appeared and the soul felt its worth./The thrill of hope, the weary world rejoices/For yonder breaks a new and glorious morn."

Right now, our world is weary. Weary of politics, weary of war, weary of struggle. I invite you to find in Jesus this Advent the thrill of hope, because in him there is hope, there is life, life to the full (John 10:10).

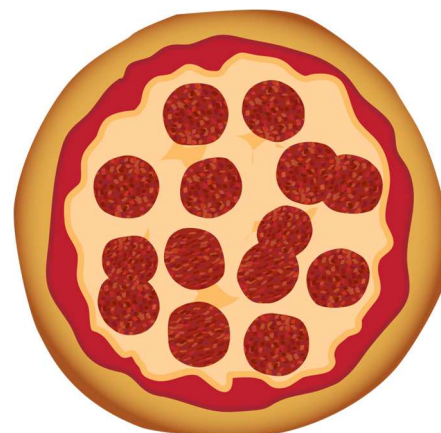
Worship: So Christmas Day is on a Sunday this year!

DISCO: Continue the journey

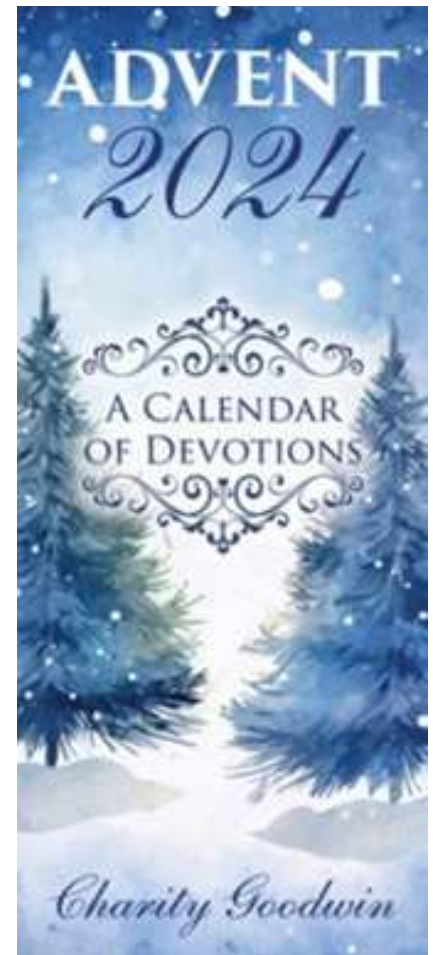
Discipling Commission encourages you to continue on your journey with God and practicing the ways of Jesus. Our Sunday School class options are as follows:

We started the stand in December of 2018 and thanks to God, the community, my family and friends – we have raised approximately \$19,000 total for the shelter! I hope that you will be able to stop over and have some hot cocoa, eat a sweet snack, chat with friends and enjoy the live music.
