Advent Calendar Project

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Pastor's Corner: Two unique Sundays

In 2006, three pastors, including Chris Seay, who attended Baylor University with me, founded the Advent Conspiracy. The Advent Conspiracy is a movement to help followers of Jesus reject the materialism of Western consumerist culture and live into the true meaning of Christmas. It's built around four challenges:

- Worship Fully
- Spend Less
- Give More
- Love All

Worship Fully: The point of Christmas is that in Jesus, God has taken on humanity and become accessible to us in a new way and our appropriate response is worship. I challenge you to set aside time daily during Advent for prayer and Scripture reading, to center yourself in the love and faithfulness of

God revealed in Jesus.

The **Spend Less** challenge is to drastically reduce the amount of money you spend on Christmas gifts. Maybe this year you can only give necessary gifts like clothing or necessary household items. Make a game of seeing how little you can spend.

The **Give More** challenge is to give the gift of presence, not presents. Make a point during Advent of spending time together with members of your household. Have a game night. Make popcorn together. Check in daily with one another.

The **Love All** challenge is to, as much as you are able in these financially trying times, to take the money you would have spent on presents and give it to an organization that cares for our

neighbors in need, either nearby or far away. Mennonite Central Committee and local food banks are a couple of good places to start.

My hope for you this year is an Advent season focused on Jesus, not on waiting for delivery drivers.

Mission: Got some free time?

With this being such an odd year I am sure the way we celebrate Christmas will also be different than we may normally celebrate. The love of God for mankind is the reason Jesus was sent to earth on the first Christmas. So as believers in that baby sent so long ago, we too can show love for mankind. Hopefully we do that all throughout the year by the way we treat others—being friendly, showing kindness and being generous when we can or even when it is hard to find some extra funds.

Much like Jesus being born in such humble conditions that it was hard to think this baby could be the Messiah, we may think, “How can my small donation do any good with so much need in the world?”, especially this year. That is why I would like to encourage you to look into donating through MCC this holiday season to hopefully bring some true joy this Christmas. Many people doing something can go such a long way.

Following is an example of how MCC is meeting needs and sharing the love of Jesus to those in need.

After two hurricanes within two weeks flooded several countries in Central America twice, MCC is providing emergency food and supplies and making longer-term plans to help with recovery.

More than 100,000 people were evacuated, sometimes twice, from their houses in Nicaragua and Honduras to

shelters set up in schools and churches or to family members who live on higher ground. Farmers lost entire crops that were almost ready for harvest.

César Flores and Lizette Miranda, MCC area directors for Latin America and Haiti, live in San Pedro Sula, Honduras, where in lower-lying parts of the city, flood waters covered rooftops after both storms.

“As Anabaptists, we say service is our practice. Now is the time to serve,” said Flores. “This is the moment to serve with the Central American people – just loving those who are in need in the name of Jesus Christ.”

Congregations of Iglesia Evangélica Menonita Hondureña (IEMH; Honduran Evangelical Mennonite Church) quickly responded by providing three shelters for about 200 people in or around San Pedro Sula who had to evacuate.

MCC is partnering with IEMH and with Comisión Social Menonita (Mennonite Social Action Commission) by providing emergency food assistance and cleaning and hygiene supplies to people as they return home and COVID-19 masks for people at shelters.

In remote areas of Guatemala where houses and communities were flooded,

the Q’eqchi’ Mennonite Church conference provided shelter and distributed blankets, relief kits and hygiene kits that MCC provided to people living in the Alta Verapaz area.

Miranda said she sees a “loaves and fishes” effect taking place, referring to a Bible passage where Jesus fed a multitude with five loaves of bread and two fish.

Let God use *your* “loaves and fish” to be multiplied to help many.

Paul Heimbach and daughters Karen and Jan sport identical Christmas decorations. (Karen definitely wins "Best Shadow Cast"!)




