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Pastor's Corner: Pursuing faithfulness

During October and November, we're going to be exploring in worship the New Testament book of James. James was written by one of Jesus' brothers, who was a leader in the church in Jerusalem after Jesus' death and resurrection.

James feels different than most of the letters in the New Testament—it has a different structure and organizational plan. In many ways, it is like the Old Testament books of Proverbs and Ecclesiastes, full of wisdom.

One of my favorite things about the book of James is that it is intensely practical—it is filled with advice for daily living. One of my favorite parts of the book is in the first chapter. In verse five, James writes: "If any of you lacks wisdom, you should ask God, who gives generously to all without finding fault, and it will be given to you."

What amazing good news! We so often feel like we lack the wisdom and insight to make the difficult decisions that we encoun-


ter in our daily lives.

Our perplexity is no surprise to God. God has already provided what we need. All we need to do is ask! And God doesn't find fault with us for asking. How often have you been reluctant to ask for something you needed, because you felt like you would be teased or ridiculed for being needy. But God knows what we need even before we do, and God never reproaches us for being needy. All we have to do is ask.

The certainty that God will meet our need for wisdom should embolden us to seek insight for the daily issues we face. I hope this week you will be encouraged to ask God for the wisdom you need to face your unique challenges, confident that God desires to give us what we need to make good decisions and walk in the way of Jesus.

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Code Blue: How can you help?

As Code Blue approaches its 10th year of operation, they are excited about their move into larger facilities. It's the same building, the Masonic Lodge in downtown Quakertown—it's just a bigger space.

As the unhoused population in Bucks County continues to grow, the Quakertown homeless shelter usage increases. The shelter provides a warm bed, plus supper and breakfast, on cold winter nights when the temperature is 26 degrees or lower. They can't open without enough volunteers to staff the shelter.

After nine very successful years for the program, AHUB (Advocates of the Homeless of Upper Bucks) hopes to broaden their volunteer base for the season. Is this the year YOU volunteer.

Volunteers help in all kinds of ways—admissions, food prepar-

ers, overnight chaperons in two shifts, site coordinators, task force members, and morning aides who clean the facilities.

While the shelter needs donated items of all kinds, West Swamp has been asked to focus only on donating new twin sized blankets this year.

God of loneliness and longing,


of bushfires and wilderness, of soup kitchens and border towns,
